The Kendall community park, is becoming well used by the community, and the ladies of the Kendall men's shed, Annie, Pat, Melody, Naomi and Lucille, have coerced male labourers into the revamping of the too long ignored gardens. There has been an incredible amount of community support for the gardens, Ron and Margy Foster, Kew Nursery, and the support for the laying of the memorial bricks, has also been outstanding. The ladies wish to thank Port Council for their support and assistance. The roses have been taken to hospital as they were not surviving under the gum trees, the ladies are liaising with council on the new garden bed.

The KENDALL Men's Shed, are as busy as a one armed brick layer in Beirut. The men have made and delivered and installed seven picnic tables for the North Haven Bowling club, and they have orders for five more! The men were especially pleased to see the Anzac crosses go up in Laurieton, and the associated television coverage. The shed was approached to make these crosses by Ms Joy Ward, as other quotes were cost prohibitive. The men from Kendall unanimously decided, we should provide the timber, manufacture the 250 crosses, two coats of paint, make and mark the ANZAC stencil, fit the rosettes and deliver the crosses to the LUSC, which we did at no cost to Joy's organisation. The work took a couple of weeks, but the results speak for themselves. So when you see those crosses know that they are a gift to the servicemen who marched from LAURIETON in 1915, from the men of Kendall Men's shed.

The Kew War Memorial which is situated on the Pacific Highway at Kew, is currently undergoing restoration. For some time it looked neglected and very much overgrown by bushes. The Mens Shed at Kendall is assisting with the new flagpole, which it has been found is actually a ships mast. The landscaping around the Memorial has been cleaned of annoying "prickly" shrubbery, and new gravel will soon be laid. Edsteins and Sons of Taree erected the stone for the War Memorial, and the Inscription on it reads, For God and Empire, Erected by the residents of Kew in honour of the men of the town who served in the Great War, 1914 – 1918.

Battle at Eureka Stockade By Sandra Haswell

It is over 160 years since this battle took place in Ballarat Victoria. It was a defining part of Australia's history and its importance cannot be underestimated. At the time it was a bloody and confronting event which saw the authority maintained by law enforcement troopers brought into question, and had at its beginnings, a murder, unlawful detention, harassment of miners and behaviour by all concerned worrying and unruly. It perhaps started with the death of a scottish miner in early Oct. 1854, and following the trial of those accused of his murder, an open verdict was handed down. The verdict fuelled rebellion that was to follow. License checks on "diggings" were twice weekly and arrests followed, and discontent grew. So serious was the situation than 450 troopers were dispatched to maintain order. In December 1854 the battle at the Eureka Stockade took place. The rest is histo-The Eureka Flag flew over the battleground, rv. and for 100 years it was kept in the Ballarat Gal-The flag is now regarded as an Australian lerv. icon. It has earned its place in our history to hang now in the Ballarat Fine Arts Gallery alongside watercolours depicting the battle.

The April meeting was held at Benwerrin Bamboo Nursery curtesy of Sandra Lefeuvre.. John Carter welcomed those that could attend especially a couple of new faces. While John talked tea and coffee was handed around and various munchies. The speaker for the May meeting will be an arborist who will speak about looking after your trees. In June there will be a talk on camellias. The July meeting is the club's 11th birthday. It was agreed that those who wished to participate could bring a small present for exchange by ticket draw. On Saturday 25 July the club will hold its horticultural speaker's day and volunteers to assist are requested. The award for the most successful member exhibiter at the Kendall show went to Doug Pope. The fertilizers available from the garden club will be from a more expensive source providing better quality. If you take any fertilizer be sure to pay the appropriate amount as very little profit is made and forgetting to pay costs the club. It was agreed that the Kendall Gardeners Club will contribute an amount to the School of Arts Hall to assist in building a boardwalk over the roots of the tree at the entrance. It was decided to plan a meeting which would be of the workshop format where about 4 1/2 hour workshops would take place and members would circulate from workshop to workshop. Thoughts of holding more of the excursion type meetings were discussed.

Sandra welcomed everyone to her place and explained the history of getting started with bamboo. The initial plantings required bucketing water to the young plants. The nursery has 60 to 70 different varieties of bamboo. The bamboo is grown for timber, shoots, landscaping, privacy and even security with the

thorny variety. The tea and coffee was served in disposable cups made from bamboo. Not all bamboos are edible.

There are 40-50 different varieties of bamboo used for timber which can grow up to 90ft. China and the Bamboo Society are investigating setting up a bamboo mill in Taree. Some of the timber is stronger than steel. Propagation is done by taking cuttings of mature stems with laterals and potted out. Some bamboos are difficult to propagate. The young plants need looking after in the first year of summer and winter. Fertiliser high in nitrogen helps boost their growth. The roots are not deep but the larger the bamboo the deeper it will grow. All of the bamboo at the nursery is of the clumping variety. The clump size is determined by the type of bamboo. The cuttings are not taken until the plant is at least three years old. If the cutting is taken any earlier the newly cloned plant will have a short lifespan (about 3 years). Normal lifespan can be up to 100years old. Raising bamboos from seeds is possible but takes years longer to get the plant to its full potential.

Biodiversity Farm Walk

As part of the 'Greater Hastings – building resilience through riparian landscape links project', funded by the Australian Government Biodiversity Fund, Hastings Landcare will showcase the restoration and conservation of significant vegetation on Mortons Creek on **Sunday 3rd May**.

"We will be sharing lessons learnt from our 15 years of practical experience restoring the creekside or riparian vegetation," says Cathy Eggert, who will be guiding the walk around her family's farm where they have reserved more than 20ha of forest in perpetuity.

The Eggerts have received several grants over the years to help with erosion and weed control as well as fencing and off-stream watering: "Thanks to Hastings Landcare and the Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife, we currently have two bush regeneration projects in the riparian areas. Over the next three years we are making a concerted effort to control invasive weeds, flood-proof fences and expand the width of the riparian zone with plants sourced from the property."

"It is quite a commitment but we are proud of what we have achieved and get such a buzz when habitat continually improves and we discover yet another sensitive or threatened species. Of course, we have made mistakes, especially with fencing in the flood zone and we're happy to share lessons we have learnt along the way." Experts in birds and bush regeneration will be on hand to share their knowledge and provide practical demonstrations of bush safety and weed control. If you're thinking of doing some conservation work this will be a great opportunity to find out about funding options and get help with planning and applications.

Death & Taxes

The two things that you can't avoid in life are death and taxes. Sure, we can't avoid death, but corporations seem to be avoiding tax. Consequently, countries around the world are running out of revenue.

Most governments are continually looking for new sources of tax revenue that are not politically suicidal. Our government tells us it wants to start a national conversation and to reform the tax system. So let's look at totally new paradigms. The Income Tax system is archaic. It was devised back in the Industrial Revolution. Today, with the advent of computers, there are simpler, better, and more equitable ways to collect revenue. A viable alternative to our current system is to replace all taxes with one tax - the DEBIT TAX (also known as the Tobin Tax, Robin Hood Tax, Financial Transactions Tax). It is the most efficient system of taxation ever devised and Europe is looking at it seriously.

Here's how it works. Every hour of the day, money is withdrawn from savings accounts, cheque accounts, insurance companies, business and investment organisations, and financial institutions of all kinds. Whenever a person, financial institution, or company withdraws money by cash, cheque or electronically, a 1% tax is automatically debited. That 1% is then electronically transferred to the Australian Federal Treasury. The tax is collected electronically and continuously - not quarterly or annually - and without paperwork of any kind. You don't have to do a thing. Let's say you have an annual salary of \$30,000. With today's system, if you add up all the hidden taxes (GST, payroll tax, property rates, fuel excise, stamp duty, capital gains tax, land tax, company tax and more) you'll be paying about \$15,000, half of your earnings, in tax. Under the Debit Tax system, you would only pay \$300.

On a national level, a 1% Debit Tax would provide Australia with tax revenue of approx \$470 billion annually. The current system only provides approx \$215 billion. It's hard to believe that a tiny 1% national Debit Tax could replace all other taxes at the Federal, State and Local Government levels. Unlike all other tax-



ation systems, the Debit Tax does not require anyone to save receipts and fill in Tax Forms. This eliminates potential sources of corruption and tax evasion. Why would a company bother hiding money in tax havens that charge 2 or 3% when the Debit Tax is only 1% and when they can also avoid the 3.75 % payroll tax? Imagine, we could eliminate the bureaucratic nightmare known as the Taxation Department, and save billions more in money and angst. The Debit Tax would see the demise of destabilising currency speculation. This tax would eat away the profits of speculators who move massive amounts of money around the globe in a bid to cash in on small currency fluctuations.

The more countries who adopt the tax, the better for everyone. So let's push for proper tax reform and stop fiddling at the edges.


